On 17 July, I participated in the joint installation ceremony of the Inner Wheel Club of Kampala, President Annette Mawejje and the Inner Wheel Club of Gaba, President Barbara Immaculate Mbonye.

From Uganda, I zoomed to India to attend the installation of President Sree Chandrika Anil, Inner Wheel Club of Ootacamund, District 320 on 18 July.

On the same day, I attended the installation of President Mita Shah, Inner Wheel Club of Coimbatore North, District 320. I was the first International Inner Wheel President to attend this ceremony in 31 years!

On 25 July, I was invited to the installation of District 302 Chairman Patibanda Yasoda at the Inner Wheel Club of Vijayawada.

On 10 to 13 August, I presented my Presidential Theme, its priorities and its goals on four scheduled Zoom Meetings organised by IIW Administrator Alan Phillips. The following groups were invited: IIW Executive Committee Members, National/Association Presidents and National Representatives, Districts without National Representatives, District Chairmen (1st group), District Chairmen (2nd group), IIW Vice-President with Board Directors and IIW Editor, and Non-Districted Clubs' Presidents. Again to Italy, on 19 September, to attend the 1st Assembly of District 211 at Enna. They are the examples of strong women our world needs in order to be a stronger world.

there is a way". This saying connotes a traditional event carried out by my District 206 and Rotary District 2060 Clubs every year. Candidatures of people with disablities are sent by Clubs and later examined by an ad hoc committee. The names of the candidates to be honoured and the prizes are decided. Serving As IIW Vice-President With All My Heart and Mind

As International Inner Wheel Vice-President this IW year, I have been working daily with my fellow members in the Executive Committee: President Ebe Martines, Immediate Past President Bina Vyas, Treasurer Sarita Lunani, and Constitution Chairman Sissel Michelsen. As VP, I am a member of the Constitution Committee together with President Ebe and CC Sissel.

It is a bit challenging because the Philippines is 7 hours ahead of the IIW Headquarters in UK, 6 hours ahead of Italy and Norway, and 2 hours ahead of India.

I am still active as a Certified Public Accountant. Every day as I start my work, I will first check my emails and messages about work, followed by communications from IIW, which usually start to arrive at 4 pm onwards (Philippines time). Discussions and deliberations are queries about by-laws such as election, qualification in position, naming of club or district and many more.

Before the start of the IW year, the first task was the allocation of Non-Districted Clubs (NDC) and Districts without National Representative (NR) to the 15 Board Directors (BDs). President Ebe had kindly given tips. When the BDs started writing to these clubs, some did not reply. I helped by getting updated contact details from the IIW Directory and reports of the past years' BDs, checked if the non-responding clubs have paid their capitation for the last two years and also check if they are still active. These clubs report to IIW through the BDs and in turn, the BDs keep them updated with IIW information.

I also work closely with Treasurer Sarita about the payment of capitation by the NDCs and ask BDs to follow up in case payments are pending.

Our International Editor/Media Manager Yeok San also makes requests through me for news articles from the BDs, NDCs, and UN Representatives for publication.

Another very important function of my office is as Coordinator of the UN Representatives. Their report for the first quarter was shared with the Executive Committee and the BDs. I was able to attend two online events of the United Nations: the Food Systems Summit and International Day of Older Persons which I found very interesting and relevant. On 25 August at 7:00 am (Philippines time), I was invited by NR Sandra Vivanco to speak online to members in Mexico. In attendance were officers and members of Districts 417 and 418, and some prospective members. I spoke about the history and membership of Inner Wheel. I gained new friends who, like me, have long been in IW.

Past BD Dilruba Ahmed in Bangladesh invited me to be a guest speaker at their International Peace Day Celebration. Their theme: "From the Hills to the Sea, Let There Be Peace and Harmony". It was heartwarming to know that IW members are all actively working to promote peace in their part of the world.

The IIW COVID-19 Disaster and Vaccination Fund Committee this IW year is under my care, together with BDs Gemma Pirondini, Margie Jones, Phebean Alade and Zena Coles. The IIW Board has approved support of the Albert Schweitzer Hospital in Haiti for its vaccination programme. We are currently seeking out IW representatives to witness their vaccine rollout.

With online events becoming a norm in the Philippines, I have been regularly invited as guest speaker in the Clubs and at National and District Leadership Training Seminars, National, District, and Club Inductions, International Peace Day Celebration, Awards Day, launching of Wheel Can Cerv, and many more online events.

I relish my work as IIW Vice-President because I can serve at a higher level in the organisation I love most. I can see the ways of working in the different clubs around the world and appreciate how members truly enjoy serving together as IW friends.

Way back in 1987 when I became a member of the Inner Wheel Club of Grorud, District 31, Norway, I didn't see the consequences of my membership. I joined because of our third objective and rather unwillingly because the only criterion of acceptance was my husband's membership in Rotary.

"Our Bestemor is the best!"

A well-educated woman working as a teacher should hold enough qualifications for membership, in her own right! It took me 25 years of membership before I, along with my Inner Wheel friends, enjoyed the Tulip Revolution in Istanbul in 2012. The only enjoyable revolution in history when we as IW members could accept the women we wanted on our own grounds.

The international aspect of Inner Wheel is still the reason for my membership. **Friendship is the glue, the building material holding us together.** If we don't try to meet other people with respect and warmth, friendship will never grow.

This is also how it works in the current IIW Executive Committee (EC) and IIW Constitution Committee. We were thrown together with different tools, experience and upbringing in our luggage nearly 5 months ago. If I think that only my own tools are the most effective for change or maintenance, I'm not a team player. Sometimes we have to try out different tools, and if they don't release the expected outcome, we have to try new ones for the end result: a stronger and even more meaningful organisation for all members.

Five months ago we had started to believe that the COVID situation would change for the better during the summer, but now we have experienced that the infections are far more out of control and that there will be successive ups and downs in the years to come.

So in the handover ceremonies (actually no hands, only faces were involved), how I wish that President Ebe, Vice-President Zenaida and I could sit down together and talk through challenges sent us by Members! Sometimes the whole EC is involved including Immediate Past President Bina and Treasurer Sarita. Things work best face to face. But we have tried to come to terms with our present situation, and we are grateful for the gift we can use, Zoom. We zoomed for the first few days of this year, meeting up, discussing, agreeing, and eventually meeting up with our 15 Board Directors which I enjoyed, too.

By the way, the hard work started after the first week! After all committees on all levels and in all countries had had their first Zooms, we were on! Nominations of international posts are time-consuming for the Constitution Chairman—checking that every nominee has everything in place. If something is missing, they won't be candidates for the international election. E-mails fly back and forth, involving Administrator Alan. Finally, we have all nominees through! Alan and I are proud of that!

When new National Representatives take over, some are new and may not know everything. When officers below them don't know either, then it is of course the natural thing to send a query to HQ and then Alan forwards it to me. It is a classic work to try answering in a constructive way. A pure pleasure.

Then we have the more challenging questions where NRs ask for more time and want to stretch the time limits. This can of course create precedence, but sometimes we have to be flexible when a stressful situation warrants it.

Constitutions of Inner Wheel Clubs in any country may have to put up with new challenges. Sometimes, these changes are easily accepted by the Clubs when the new country's laws do not interfere directly with that of IIW.

Sometimes, only Club names are involved. When the IIW Constitution is at stake, some Clubs react more strongly than others. That is the time for engagement with the Constitution Chairman. When all parties involved have had their say, there is a possibility for a solution. This is also a time-consuming involvement, but very rewarding if we can find a way out of the problem.

Some problems are inherited when Members feel that their own cases have not been properly attended to

at an earlier stage or at present. These cases are the toughest, whether it concerns one or more persons. To come up with a proper solution that fits all involved, can be crucial but not always the case. Our Committee can give advice and hope for good response, but we will always feel that we could not do enough for all involved. This leaves me with the thought that I cannot satisfy all which shows that this function in itself can be splitting. It is certainly not how I want it to be.

I am afraid many Members think my Committee and I can work wonders. However, all our answers must be seen in the light of our current Constitution and not in how we otherwise want to have it in the future. Constitutional work is a never ending process.





New impulses create new ways of solving problems as well as inspire us to see things differently. Having said that, we may end up with new proposals for Manchester 2024. If so, then you should know that any proposal must be sent to HQ **18 months prior to the Convention**. In other words, by **7 November 2022**, less than a year from now. Then, my dear friends, your HOMEWORK is on **pp. 28-29 in C&H 2021**! To be given enough time to answer queries from you, you have to start now!

Constitution work should also include new ways of trying to solve both imminent and unexpected problems in Clubs, Districts and NGBs. IIW EC should be generous in letting them try out good ideas for a limited time of 2 years and let them come back with a realistic attitude on how to make good ideas feasible, also for others.

Especially in old Inner Wheel countries, there is a need for good ideas to keep their work going and to avoid disbandment on all levels. There should be more than one idea so that Clubs in the "danger zone" can pick a solution tailored to their needs.

Clubs can help Clubs. They have to be willing to admit that they are in trouble. Otherwise a Club can die quietly without anyone knowing. So very, very sad.

HOMEWORK: It is important to know which strategy to use for survival, and IIW should have all these strategies available in our "Gene Bank" for all to borrow. On p. 46 in C&H 2021 we need at least one new entry: **How to avoid disbandment of a Club.** Then, it will automatically be placed under General Information on our website. This is to preserve Inner Wheel's healthy future. The **"IN THE PINK" FUTURE**!

President Mary Gronningen said that projects completed were providing breakfast and dinner for the needy through 'Reach Out'. Donated toys during Christmas to a Children's Hospital and joined the RC Orihuela to assist women and children who were imprisoned. They are planning a Fund Raiser by selling handicrafts.

IWC Vigo/Spain: The Club was founded in June 2019 and currently with 10 active members. In the first year they met at a meeting room in a Hotel and during the pandemic they met on Zoom. Since the situation has improved, they have resumed their monthly meetings at a cafeteria called 'Museo del Marco'. Secretary Aracelia Garcia said that current projects are 'Amigo Vigo' centred on helping recently moved foreigners to Vigo, to adapt culturally and with their daily routines. 'Gafas' is another ongoing project where they are collecting used glasses to send to Cambodia through an NGO. They are also helping a foster home with nourishment and food under their 'Casa Hogar La Caridad' project.

Eagerly awaiting to resume my journey for 2H 2021/22.




Seetha Lakshmi Board Director 2021-2022

In 1970, Mrs. Trinidad Legarda, a Board Member from the Philippines suggested that International Inner Wheel (IIW) should apply to the United Nations for consultative status. Two years later, the ECOSOC (Economic and Social Council of the United Nations) confirmed the admittance of Inner Wheel on the Roster of Organization section.

In 1993, a General Motion was approved at the 9th Convention in Sydney, Australia, that IIW must confine its involvement with the United Nations (e.g. ECOSOC and UNICEF) to being an Observer on the Roster with a consultative status.

Our Inner Wheel representatives in UN are as follows:

The Representatives are our link to the United Nation Offices (UNO) and they attend Committee Meetings regarding important themes as: Human Rights, Rights of the Children, Conditions of Woman, the Family, the Elderly and Drugs. During this pandemic period, virtual meetings were held because physical access to the UNO were restricted.

Regularly, our Representatives submits to IIW through the IIW Vice-President, various Statements, Declarations and Calls for Action of different Committees which requires support and approval of IIW. Also, 21 days before the IIW Executive Committee meetings, reports are submitted to the IIW Vice-President on the activities of the Committees and Conferences. This same Report is presented to the IIW Governing Body Meeting and Executive Committee Meeting immediately preceding the IIW Governing Body Meeting.

Copies of the annual reports of the National Representatives are sent to our representatives at UN, to keep them informed about the work of our members.

Since March 2020, activities of all the NGO Committees in Vienna have been severely hampered due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Strict security regulations have made it impossible to have NGO meetings or events in the UN Building.

However, this does not mean that we did not work, as since then we have been holding online monthly meetings.

During the last six months there were two major activities:

The Vienna NGO COMMITTEE ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN finalised and submitted its annual Statement for the 66th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women which will take place from 14 to 25 March 2022 in New York. Priority theme: "Achieving gender equality and the empowering of all women and girls in the context of climate change, environmental and disaster risk reduction policies and programmes".

The Committee also started preparations for a Statement for the Session of the Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice which will take place in May 2022 in Vienna.

On the occasion of the "International Day of Older Persons" on 1 October, the Vienna NGO COMMITTEE ON AGEING in collaboration with the New York Committee on Ageing organised a webinar on "Digital Equity for all Ages". The event was hosted by the International Federation on Ageing.

The use of digital/technical devices is playing an important role in the day-to-day life of older people and is also an important tool in the rehabilitation of people with mental or physical handicaps.

Older persons would enormously benefit from the use of the internet, not only for their own health and welfare, but also to communicate with family-members, keep up-todate with the latest information and advice, and to help overcome the feeling of loneliness and being isolated. We saw the importance of on-line communication during the COVID-pandemic.

Other activities were a review of the Statutes, as well as preparations for the elections of the Executive Board of both of my Committees.

The positive side to all the problems due to the COVID-19 pandemic is the fact that we have learned how to use the virtual world to our benefit. It has not only allowed us to hold Committee Meetings but even more so, to establish contact and cooperate with our NGO colleagues at the other UN locations and also, as a visitor/guest, participate in UN Meetings where otherwise access is limited or even impossible. E.g. the Human Rights Session. The possibility to attend Meetings and Events of other "Ageing" and "Women" specialised NGOs has opened a whole universe of additional information.

At the end of October, I was invited to be guest speaker at the District 210 Meeting in Battipaglia, Italy in conjunction with their 40th anniversary celebration. I had the pleasure to not only meet Italian friends but could spend time with International President Ebe.

So, the past 6 months have been rather busy and I now look forward to spending the holiday season with family and friends in our house in the mountains, hopefully with snow.

March 2020: Michelle Burgess, our new representative nominated for New York, and I were ready to attend the 65th Commission on the Status of Women, a big first for Michelle. We were really excited about sharing this unforgettable experience together. But the COVID-19 pandemic changed the way the United Nations was going to conduct its business for the next 20 months.

Since then, all NGOs were frozen out of the UN building and all civil society representatives for accredited organisations have been denied entry to the UN grounds. Our passes are still pending and will not be renewed "until further notice"! The transition from large (or small!) conference rooms to online meetings has been quite challenging for us. Instead of running from one conference room to another to be able to secure a seat, we learned how to register online and navigate from one meeting to the next.

For me, it got even more challenging, as I decided to come back to my birth country, France, when the borders closed. I had to adjust to the 6-hour time difference between the United States and France. Most of my meetings were late in the evening!

Without being able to roam the rooms and engage in new face-toface interactions with other NGO representatives, the ability to meet new people and to develop new bonds has been sadly limited. So we continue our work online for International Inner Wheel and report to International Vice-President.

Unfortunately, even with the reopening of the US borders, it seems that physical participation remains under review due to anticipated continued implications of the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes participation of representatives of organisations, like International Inner Wheel, in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).

Updates should be provided as soon as they become available. Some conferences which have been scheduled for 2022 will still be held online for NGOs.

ONLINE MEETINGS attended by **UN Representatives in New York** since July 2021

- 1) 9 August 2021: Virtual commemoration of the **International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples** under the theme: "Leaving no one behind: Indigenous Peoples and the call for a new social contract". From the perspective of indigenous peoples, the new social contract must be based on genuine participation and partnership that fosters equal opportunities and respects the rights, dignity and freedoms of all
- 2) **One Planet Summit** in Marseille, France, 3-11 September 2021. On September 6, a One Planet event brought together ministers, heads of international institutions, business leaders and civil society actors to discuss the actions of One Planet's Coalitions for biodiversity preservation and restoration.
- 3) **UN Food Systems Summit**, 23 September 2021, virtual event during the UN General Assembly in New York. The summit launched bold new actions to deliver progress on all 17 SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals), each of which relies to some degree on healthier, more sustainable and equitable food systems.
- 4) 11 October 2021: International Day of the Girl under the theme "Digital generation, our generation". 2.2 billion people below the age of 25 do not have internet access at home, with girls more likely to be cut off. The pandemic has accelerated digital platforms for learning, earning and connecting while also highlighting girls diverse digital realities.
- 5) UN Sustainable Transport Conference, 14-16 October 2021: Global transport at a crossroads: UN Conference to advance actions on zero emission vehicles, boost economy and reduce inequalities. Transport is one of the single largest contributors to air and carbon pollution emissions globally. Over 1 billion people worldwide still lack adequate access to all-weather roads. In Africa, 450 million people, more than 70% of the total rural population, remain unconnected to transport infrastructures and structures.
- 6) 17 October 2021: **25th Anniversary of the UN Trust Fund** to end violence against women. This year we were cordially invited to join in commemorating the 25-year long journey of grant-giving, of support to civil society and women's rights organizations, and of commitments to making the rights of women and girls to live a life free of violence a reality for all.

International Narcotic Control Board Jagjit Pavadia, INCB President 2021.



The International Narcotic Control Board (INBC) is the independent and quasi-judicial monitoring body for the implementation of the United Nations international drug control conventions. It was established in 1968 in accordance with the Single Convention of Narcotic Drugs 1961. The thirteen members of the Board are elected in a personal capacity by the Economic and Social Council for the terms of five years.

In its 2020 Annual Report, the INCB

- highlights a global hidden epidemic: the use of drugs among older people,
- addresses the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on access to medicines, prevention, and treatment services for people with mental health and substances abuse disorder, and the illicit drug market
- urges governments to apply proportional response to drug related offences based on the rule of law and human rights,
- marks the 60th and 50th anniversary of the 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs and the 1971 Convention on Psychotropic Substances with a special report, stresses need for universal implementation.

Presenting the findings of the report at a virtual event convened by the UNOBC South Asia, Mrs. Jagjit Pavadia expressed concern about the negative effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on the global support chain of medicines. "Increasing demand for treatment of patients with COVID-19 have created further shortages and disrupted treatments and other health-related services. The report stresses that people with mental health and substance use disorder have been particularly affected by the pandemic. Mobility restrictions and social isolation have imposed greater strain on people and worsened disorder at times".

The INCB Annual Report 2020 also expresses concern about the high number of drug overdose deaths especially related to fentanyl and methamphetamine.

INCB remains concerned about steps taken by governments towards legalising cannabis for non-medical purposes and reiterates the need for States to take measures that limit the production, manufacture, and trade of cannabis to medical and scientific purposes.

During these days, the INCB commences its 132nd session in Vienna. For the first time since the onset of COVID-19 pandemic, the members meet in person.



Mrs Jagjit Pavadia reiterated the Board's commitment to support Member States in implementing the drug control conventions and advancing progress on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). In this regard, the INCB President referred to activities being carried out by the Board, including through its INCB Learning and GRIDS programmes and expressed appreciation for the participation and contributions of Member states and partner organisations. The GRIDS Programme aims to measurably reduce trafficking in dangerous substances globally, with a particular focus on dangerous new psychoactive substances not yet under international control and non-medical synthetic opioids.

The Board continues to support Member States in treaty implementation and progress towards the SDG.

The Board continues its work to ensure that there is availability of international controlled substances for medical, scientific, and industrial purposes.

- On 2 and 3 November, the Board's Standing Committee on Estimates met to review Governments' estimates of licit requirements for narcotic drugs, psychotropic substances, and precursor chemicals.
- On 17 November, the Board will hold a meeting with Member States on facilitating and supporting the implementation of Articles 12 and 13 of the 1988 Convention Against Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs And Psychotropic sSubstances, which relate to chemicals, materials and equipment used in the illicit manufacture of drugs.
- On 19 November, the Board will review the world drug situation and continue to monitor the functioning of the international drug control system.

The impact of illicit financial flows related to drug trafficking and their impact on development and security will be one of the many subjects discussed by the Board.

NO CHILD SHALL BE LOST a 3-year programme towards the 2024 Inner Wheel centennial. **Inner Wheel Germany** is collaborating with Kinderlachen e.V. to support and promote awareness of traumatised young and adolescent children in homes for children. The first projects are a pedagogical-therapeutic youth welfare facility in Offenburg, and a private children's home with youth psychiatric and psychotherapeutic services for the recovery of traumatised children in Asendorf, near Bremen. Both these facilities were provided with sports and play equipment: a swing combination at the outdoor area for the very young children at Bremen, and sports equipment in a fitness room for young people at Offenburg.

Federal Commissioner for Child Sexual Abuse, Johannes-Wilhelm Rörig, and Holger Münch (r), President of the Federal Criminal Police Office, in a Press Release on 26 May 2021 stated, "...the numbers of child victims of violence and the sharp increase in abuse against minors have deeply shocked the public. Sexual violence is everywhere and usually takes place where no one would suspect it—very close, in families, in the neighbourhood, in sports clubs and on the Internet."






INDIA. OPPORTUNITY. NGB. District 329. During the pandemic period, there was no public transport available to take to work. As a result, many were unable to work and earn a living. The **Inner Wheel Club of Calcutta Metro Maidan** under the initiative of District Chairman Jyothi Mahipal, donated a smart E-cycle each to four underprivileged women as an opportunity for them to earn a livelihood. The E-cycles are made by Motovolt, recipient of the "Best In Innovation" at the Tech India Awards 2021.

INDIA. HEALTH. NGB. District 301. Thirtyfive clubs in the District contributed to the setting up of the Inner Wheel Physiotherapy Centre at Shaheed Mahavir Park, Shivaji Colony, Rohtak. The opening ceremony on 9 Jul 2021 was officiated by Association President Saroj Katiyar, in the presence of Sh. Manmohan Goel (Mayor of Rohtak), District Chairman Anita Jain and Municipal Councillor Mukta Nagpal.





INDIA. EMPOWERMENT. NGB. The STREE SHAKTI mobile app. At the start of Inner Wheel year 2021-2022, Association President Saroj Katiyar unveiled her vision in an acronym "SHEROES". S=Stree Shakti. H=Health. E=Earth Care. R=Refresh. O=Orphanage and Old age. E=E-learning & Eradication of social ills. S=Spread Inner Wheel Wings. Stree Shakti in Hindi means women power and was created in line with the IIW Social Project theme 2021-2024 "Strong Women, Stronger World". In achieving it, a 3-step programme was devised.

The first was the development of a mobile friendly app to contain a directory of women entrepreneurs which will be a source of business contacts at the touch of a button. This app is available on Google Play and App Store for free download. Out of over 46,000 members, there is great potential in gathering entrepreneurial Inner Wheel members. Such a facility will encourage other women to join Inner Wheel.

The second is to organise online sessions to train and expose women to insights, tools, schemes etc. The best in the country will be invited to offer their expertise and advice. The app is the information centre.

The third is to organise exhibitions as a platform for the women to promote, advertise and demonstrate their products. The app serves to bring everyone under one roof.

The Stree Shakti app is already showing success among several women entrepreneurs.







ISRAEL. EDUCATION. District 99. The Inner Wheel Club of Nahariya, one of the oldest clubs in the District has had a long-term project of providing scholarships to college and university female students. These recipients are required to tutor high school student who need assistance in their studies. This has resulted in many successful high school graduates. The members of the **Inner Wheel Club of Stella Maris** in Haifa, work with an organisation which provides after-school care for children 5 to 8 years old from severe socio-economic backgrounds. Each day of the week, three members volunteer to care for these children according to their needs and interests. In one of these sessions, the Club donated a library of books and furniture. President Mary Zreik invited a wellknown writer of children's books to the opening of this facility. The children had fun in a sing-along and was engaged listening to the story-telling.



ITALY. EMPOWERMENT. NGB. District 121. DOMINA AWARD. On the 27 August 2021, the Inner Wheel Club of Terrae Sinus hosted a charity event to raise funds in support of children with disabilities. The highlight of the evening was the conferment of the Domina Award. This is conferred to women who have distinguished themselves by their courage and their will. It gives credit women who stand out in their profession and field whether nationally or internationally. It is like the "Oscar" for women with plenty of ideas in making Italy and the rest of the world a better place.





MEXICO. EDUCATION. District 417. inequality in third world countries is challenging for girls and young women. It is even more difficult for those who are orphaned and disabled. The Inner Wheel Club of Ciudad de Mexico and the Inner Wheel Club of Lomas de Chapultepec came up with the idea of providing music classes to young orphaned and blind girls. It is hoped that they by learning this skill, it can be a source of income for them in the future. At the same time, they are introduced and inspired by the beauty in the world of music.





MALAYSIA. OPPORTUNITY. District 330. WATER POVERTY. In the heartland of Pahang state in West Malaysia, lives the indigenous tribes. For years, the Temuan tribe of a village, Kampung Leleh, had no access to piped water. Shortage of clean water was a chronic problem. Without clean potable water, the children were at risk of diarrhoea and other diseases. Their plight was brought to the attention of the Inner Wheel Club of Kuala Lumpur. In collaboration with SMGB Group as the major donor, two tube wells were constructed, at two locations, with a combined output of 1,100 gallons per hour. These tube wells have a filtration system that ensures compliance with water quality standards of the World Health Organisation and the Malaysian Ministry of Health. On 30 November 2021, President Jinny Lum and 9 members from the Club travelled into the village for the launching ceremony. They brought along 95 high capacity ceramic water filters for each family home, gift bags for the children, and chocolates, sweets and jeans. It was a joyful day for the whole village especially for the children who were gleefully peering into their gift bags.

NEPAL. HEALTH. District 350. The Inner Wheel Club of Rajdhani recently donated a fridge and other needed items to Aashadeep Nepal at Nayapati, a mental health rehabilitation centre where patients are sourced from jails, streets and some referrals from hospitals. It is a non-profit



non-governmental facility which the Club supports from time to time. The **Inner Wheel Club of Balaju** gives aid to a home, Om Briddha Ashram at Bhaktapur, for the elderly. Recently, they donated blankets, slippers, personal care items, kitchen ware and food. Two years ago, they planted medicinal and ornamental trees around the ashram like lemon, guava and



NIGERIA. HEALTH. District 912. Global Handwashing Day was held on 15 October 2021 with an awareness campaign. Flyers, banners, social media postings and roadshows at five primary schools in Agege, Lagos were organised. The aim is to inculcate a need to have the habit of regular handwashing to combat transmission of various diseases. At the schools, the children learnt how to wash their hands. District Chairman Adefunke Shinaba and other Inner Wheel members also presented giant water buckets, wash basins, liquid soap and hand sanitisers to the school.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL CHILD was celebrated in Ogun state, in collaboration with Cecy Health. The **Inner Wheel Clubs of Ijebu Ode** and **Odogbolu** were the host clubs. The programme was tagged 'Developing the Girl Child and Caring for the Pregnant Women'. District Chairman Modupe Oyeduntan informed everyone present that the Inner Wheel theme for the year is Pink First, which means putting the Girl Child (Women) and all that concerns them in terms of Health, Education, Opportunity

and Empowerment, first. The Cecy Health team came with a full range of provisions—free eye screening tests and free prescription glasses were given out. There was an array of dental services. Blood pressure screening, free prescriptions and medication tablets were given out to those who needed them. Personal care items were distributed to the secondary school girls. Over a hundred pregnant women received items in preparation for their delivery including mosquito nets. The event ended with a celebratory dance of thanks from the community.



NIGERIA. OPPORTUNITY. NGB. Women who have been trained in the skills of a trade will need working tools so that they can earn a living after graduation. In conjunction with the installation of Club President Zainab Aliyu, the **Inner Wheel Club of Garki, District 910**, donated sewing machines, popcorn making machines, grinding machines and hair dryers to 13 indigent women of Abuja. The **Inner Wheel Club of Isolo, District 912**, provided refresher training courses. The two recipients of the hairdressing course were given a sewing machine each and another two in fashion designer, received an industrial hair dryer each.



NEW ZEALAND. OPPORTUNITY. NGB. District NZ294. PERIOD POVERTY happens when there is a lack of menstrual care products, sanitation and education. Girls and women will skip school or work. It is rife even in advanced countries. Low income means choosing betwen buying menstrual products or food. Period Poverty is a District project in collaboration with Days for Girls' New Zealand. Members raise funds for materials to make up the kits. On one occasion, the **Inner Wheel Club of Tawa** connected with Sherpa friends and delivered 24 kits to the girls and women of the Cheboche village (west of Mt Everest in the Solu Khumbu region of Nepal). A visiting nurse explained to them how to use. The Inner Wheel ladies were led by the real expressed need of people on the ground.





PAKISTAN. EDUCATION. District 341. Education is the ticket out of poverty. For the past years, the Inner Wheel Club of Sahiwal Central has helped two girls studying medicine and ten young women have completed the Masters degree. The Inner Wheel Clubs of Lahore Hope and Lahore Sharqi have each paid for the expenses of poor medical students. The Inner Wheel Clubs of Harappa and Sahiwal Central supported 62 college girls for their Bachelors degree. Girls from low income families have received financial aid to complete vocational courses in sewing, stitching and dressmaking. Most clubs of District 341 have been helping school students by paying their fees, expenses and providing school paraphernalia.



PHILIPPINES. HEALTH. NGB. District 383. WHEEL CAN CERV. The **Inner Wheel Club of Makati Central** organised a Cervical Cancer Screen Caravan on 30 July 2021, in partnership with CerviQ, a social enterprise. Jointly with the Inner Wheel

Clubs of **Makati, Makati North, San Antonio, Taguig, Paranaque** and **Marilao** (District 377), they sponsored screening free of cost. Support was provided by the Rotary Clubs of Manila Kalaw and Manila South. Wheels Can Cerv willbe a longterm project initiated in 2019. The women of Tondo, residents of one of the poorer quarters were among 50 women alotted for screening. 21% were found positive for HPV, with one referred for immediate biopsy. In the Philippines, the cost of the HPV vaccine and Screening are beyond the reach of 90% of families. A dose is equivalent to two weeks' salary of

a regular worker. One screening is about a week's salary. By the time cervical cancer is detected, the patient is already in the 3rd or 4th stage and the cost of medical treatment becomes extremely expensive. It is the second deadliest cancer among



PAKISTAN. EMPOWERMENT. District 342. The Inner Wheel Club of Rawalpindi gives aid to Darakhshan, a resource and training centre for girls and women with disabilities in Rawalpindi, Pakistan. At the knitting unit, the Club will provide materials and kits. The members also helps in the training and creative work. On one of their visits, they met Samina, a trainee who showed much interest in learning. Samina was striken with polio as a baby and lost her parents when young. She could not continue school due to her disability. Her two younger siblings took up odd jobs to take care of her. Darakhshan accepted Samina in their skill development programme. Club members also supported her and a few other girls. Through her hard work and determination, Samina graduated and is now the head trainer of the centre, transferring the skills she has and empowering other girls. She is an example to others that disabilities is not inability and that everyone has a right to dream—nothing can stop you when you are determined to rise and shine.



women in the Philippines. Yet it is the ONLY cancer that is preventable and curable. WHEEL CAN CERV continues to evolve. The target: ELIMINATE cervical cancer by 2050.





SENEGAL. OPPORTUNITY. District 909. The **Inner Wheel Club of Dakar Teranga** supports SPER (Solidarité pour les Enfants des Rues meaning the Solidarity for Street Children). SPER can host temporary accommodations and counselling for 25 school dropouts found on the street until they resume studies and return to their families. Their motto is, "The child's place is at school or at home, not on the street". In one visit, they donated school supplies, foodstuff and toiletries.



SWEDEN. EMPOWERMENT. NGB.

The Inner Wheel Clubs of Districts 232 to 241 participate in **Inner Wheel Sweden**'s national project to sponsor the training of drug detection dogs employed by the Swedish customs. Since 1984 until early November 2021, 81 dogs have been donated. Training takes 6 months during which the dog lives closely with its handler.

Once graduated, they work together for 8 to 10 years. On 8 November 2021, two car loads of members, one from Mora and another from Borlänge, travelled to Rosersberg to participate in a training session. The members had the opportunity to act as decoys. Drugs were placed in their clothes and shoes. The 3-hour session was an instructive, astonishing and thrilling experience as they could see how sharp the dogs were in searching and detecting drugs. SRI LANKA. EDUCATION. District 322. The closure of schools for long periods as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted the education of children in more ways than one, bringing about the need for alternative ways to continue learning. This has resulted in a shift to technologyenabled learning. Unfortunately, the social inequalities, further magnified due to the pandemic, have made it difficult for children from the most disadvantaged households to access and participate due to many reasons. On 8 September 2021, in line with UN International Literacy Day's theme "Literacy for human centred recovery: narrowing the digital divide", the Inner Wheel Club of Colombo presented a host of devices to St John Bosco's College in Kalauaggala, Hanwella (a small village 30 km from Colombo). The devices would enable students attend online school.

TOGO. OPPORTUNITY. District 909. The **Inner Wheel Club of Lomé** presented a school bag stitched with the Inner Wheel logo to each child at the Togokomé public primary school. In the bag were school supplies such as pens notebooks, geometric sets and slates. The pre-school children received playdough and cookies.

In the following month, as Christmas drew near, they travelled 95 km to Notsè to an orphanage run by the Sisters of Our Lady of Nazareth. They brought gifts of rice, oil, pasta, tomatoes, milk, cookies,

juice, sugar, baby diapers, soap, detergent, clothes and lots of loincloth material for making clothes for the orphaned children.







TURKEY. OPPORTUNITY. District 242 & 244. Parts of Turkey has been devastated by the summer wildfire. By the end of July, there were 270 wildfires in 53 provinces across Turkey. At that time, three wildfires were still raging, nine lives were lost, agricultural land destroyed and livestock perished, trees razed to the ground and hundreds were left homeless. Many Inner Wheel Clubs in Turkey rallied to give humanitarian aid. In Manavgat, the Inner Wheel Club of Beyoğlu donated clothes, shoes and boots, medical supplies, fireproof gloves, textile and head lamps with batteries. The Inner Wheel Club of Eskişehir donated to the Marmaris City Hall where the victims were housed. The Inner Wheel Club of Suadiye donated water pump reductors for firefighting in the Mugla regions and also personal items for the victims. The Inner Wheel Club of İzmir sent gloves, masks, headlamps, batteries, and protective clothing to firefighters and local volunteers. After the fire disasters, District 242 announced a project to regenerate the forests. With contributions from the Inner Wheel Clubs of Beyazit, Boğaziçi, Bursa, Dalyan, Edirne, Eskişehir and Suadiye, 399 saplings were donated in order to heal the wounds of mother earth.

MOMBASA. EDUCATION. Non-districted. The Inner Wheel Club of Mombasa with the help of the Rotary Club of Mombasa, renovated the classroom at the Makanzani Nursery School which had become dilapidated due to termites. Rainwater collection tanks was installed to mitigate the water shortage. The Club is also sponsoring six girls for their education as a long-term project. Two who started in 2019 have taken their finals and waiting for results. Once these students graduate, they can work and support their siblings.







AUSTRALIA. HEALTH. Non-districted. The **Inner Wheel Club of Gosford North** has been making fiddle mats for the last 4 years. They can be used by people suffering from dementia and autism. The recent batch was given to residents of an aged care facility. What are fiddle mats? A fiddle mat is a small lap blanket or quilt that has many sections and items creatively sewn into it. There are zips, keys, old watches, handkerchiefs that slide in and out of pockets, buttons, Velcro closures, differently textured fabrics, braids,



ribbons and buttons attached. Commercially, each fiddle mat can cost over AUD100. Seniors with Alzheimer's or dementia often experience restless hands and they use their sensory mats to alleviate agitation by giving them something to fiddle with and focus on. The fiddle mat provides comfort to residents who are stressed, allows them to self-sooth and improves their quality of life. Fiddle mats were donated to a Special Education Unit at a local school for use during reading lessons. The teachers noted that while fiddling with the mat, students were less stressed about their "failing" at reading and became more confident and proficient at reading. Fiddle mats were donated to the Surgery Recovery Ward where they are used to keep elderly patients calm and help to stop these patients pulling out their IV lines, and other tubes. This project has also benefited the Club members, who recycle items from their sewing cupboards. The members are kept busy with a project to work on especially during the COVID-19 lockdown.

LITHUANIA. Non-districted. The Inner Wheel Club of Kaunas has been working with the NGO "Save the Children". The Club received an SOS to help refugee women who are pregnant and their newborns. Members rallied and donated necessary items such as diapers, bottle nipples, feeding bottles and towels. The Club has also organised a painting lesson conducted by the reknown Lithuanian painter, Irena Mikuličiūtė for the "The chimney of home" children. It was held at the Kaunas Botanical Garden (or Vytautas Magnus University Botanical Garden). The garden was founded in 1923, houses cultural and natural heritage for plant conservation and research. It is a great place to visit for education and tourism.



USA. OPPORTUNITY. District 519. In April 2021, the **Inner Wheel Club of Citrus Heights** collaborated with the Flying Samaritans to send school supplies, blankets, personal hygiene items, toys, balls and drawstring bags made by a member, to a village in Mexico during one of their medical supplies run. In September, the club



members assembled 50 'care' bags to give to teachers at a local school.



The effects of the pandemic on education and teachers having to teach online has taken a toll on their morale. The bags contain personal messages of encouragement and were hand delivered to the homes of each teacher (working from home) by the school administrators.

CANADA. District 707. The **Inner Wheel Club of Ottawa** celebrates a different country each month, presented by that member who represent the culture, sights, history and food. The photo (left) was in a meeting where they celebrated with the members from Lebanon and Jordan.



CROATIA. District 191. 123 Inner Wheel Clubs around the world came to the aid of earthquake victims in Croatia. The catastrophe happened near Christmas of 2020. As a worldwide organisation, Inner Wheel has Clubs in Croatia. They quickly mobilised their resources to inform, make appeals, and identify victims and their needs. The aid that poured in were beyond their expectations. As the fund continued to grow, besides basic needs, gifts in-kind and moral support, seven families were given fully equipped mobile and wooden houses. Members of District 191 witnessed first hand and felt the strength, unity and generosity of Inner Wheel Clubs around the world. They are ever grateful for the help that came when it most needed. In return, District 191 made a donation to the IIW COVID-19 and Vaccination Fund (COVID-19 DVF).



DENMARK. NGB. Handmade colourful and multi-purpose baskets were sourced in support of a Danish NGO working in Madagascar. Basket weaving is a traditional craft for livelihood mainly by women in Madagascar. To date, more than 5,000 "Madagascar baskets" have been sold by clubs of **Inner Wheel Denmark** to raise funds. The project united members towards a common activity of raising funds and find creative uses to market the baskets. Each time a basket is sold, members take the opportunity to tell the story of Inner Wheel, our values and causes.



Elderly Inner Wheel members are also lending a hand in community service. In the comforts of their home, they knit and crochet children's clothes in a project called "FROM YARN TO CHILD", to be sold at shops run by Mødrehjælpen, an NGO supporting vulnerable women and children with a wide network throughout Denmark.

FRANCE & SENEGAL. NGB FAMAT District 72 & District 909. Three Inner Wheel Clubs of District 72 in FAMAT linked up with District 909 (Senegal, West Africa) on 9 Nov 2021 in Tours, France. FAMAT is an abbreviation of the national governing body "Association des Clubs Inner Wheel de France, Andorre, Maroc, Algérie, Tunisie". 
